- 4. Public Comment: President Bear requested public comment. Bryan Wyer provided an update on a recent Empowering Black Businesses event, with a turnout of approximately 80 attendees.
- 5. Approval of Agenda: President Bear proposed an agenda amendment to include discussion regarding FloridaWest's newly retained CEO, Chris Platé. KC Gartman moved to approve the agenda as amended; Dr. Powell seconded. Passed unanimously.
- 6. Approval of Minutes. Kelvin Enfinger moved to approve the October 22, 2024, meeting minutes as presented; Olevia McNally seconded. Passed unanimously.
- 7. Approval of Financials. Treasurer Olevia McNally led a review of the upcoming fiscal year budget, as well as the current balance sheet. Board members discussed the ACH payment transition. McNally clarified prior Audit Committee minutes and confirmed that there are no issues presently identified by the auditors. The board members discussed the status of the bookkeeping services Request for Proposals.

Dr. Marcus McBride moved to approve the October 2024 financials; Matt Davis seconded. Passed unanimously.

- 8. Bylaws. Counsel presented the proposed Bylaws changes, including expansion of the Executive Committee. President Bear invited discussion. Verdell Hawkins moved to approve the Bylaws amendment; Dr. Marcus McBride seconded. Passed unanimously.

Andrews provided an update on Project Sable, including site utility discussions and cost estimates to expand infrastructure to the identified site.

Andrews shared an update regarding a Foreign Trade Zone workshop staff is preparing in conjunction with PEDC.

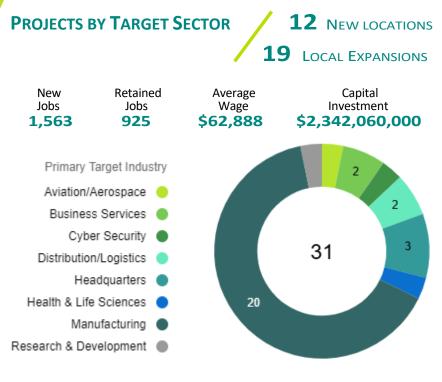

Rooney presented current metrics including rental income, tenant companies in the building, and the pipeline for occupancy. Rooney welcomed new CO:LAB employee Annie Rose. Rooney provided updates on new local startups, including Scene Pensacola, a database of the art and music scene in Pensacola. CO:LAB recently hosted a venture capitalist to critique entrepreneurial pitch decks, which was received well by the participants.
- c. Campaign. Rick Byars provided an update on the Built to Grow Campaign, including the recent additional companies joining. Byars emphasized staff's commitment to assisting the new CEO in the campaign and encouraged other board members to do the same.
- d. Communications Update. Jeff Rogers shared an update regarding recent announcements. The Pensacola News Journal will share the CEO announcement. Rogers provided metrics from the website and social media. He discussed the CO:LAB website, including opportunities to improve the backend content data management system.
- 10. Other Business: Staff discussed conversations with the new FloridaWest CEO, Chris Platé. He is eager to begin, and we look forward to his leadership. Preparations for his arrival are underway, and staff has arranged ongoing conversations to begin introducing Mr. Platé to the community. Dr. Meadows volunteered the third floor of CO:LAB to host a meet and great to welcome Mr. Platé.

STUDY OVERVIEW

As part of their ongoing support of Florida's military personnel, military families, and defense industry, the Florida Defense Support Commission authorized this biennial update to the defense economic impact analysis report. This booklet provides a summary of the updated findings based on the latest personnel and spending data. As in previous years, this study relies on data from the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD), the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, the U.S. Department of the Treasury, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, and the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis.

From 2020 to 2022, the state experienced a 21% nominal increase in total direct defense spending, growing from \$53.9 billion to \$65.3 billion. This total growth comprised a 21% increase in personnel compensation (despite a slightly reduced number of personnel), a 16% increase in defense procurement, and a 26% increase in retiree pensions and veterans transfer payments (despite a decrease in total veterans). The increase in overall spending permeated Florida's economy and resulted in an additional 865,937 jobs (a nearly 6,000 increase from the previous update) and \$102.6 billion in economic impact (a 6.2% increase from the previous update).

Conflicts across the globe, including in Ukraine, Southeast Asia, and the Middle East, require steadfast preparedness on the part of our nation's defense industry. The Florida Defense Support Commission's efforts have helped ensure Florida remains one of the best and most supportive states in the nation for our military installations, defense contractors, and veterans and military retirees.

Florida Hosts a Variety of Missions Critical to Our Nation's Defense

Florida is home to:

- Three of eleven unified combatant command headquarters.
- Two (of only four) deep water naval ports with adjacent airfields.
- The military's only east coast space launch facility.
- The Marine Corps' only maritime prepositioning force facility.
- Fleet Readiness Center Southeast (FRCSE), one of the Navy's largest FRCs.
- The Eastern Gulf Test & Training Range.
- Several critical research, development, training, and evaluation (RDT&E) centers.

The DoD's strategy emphasizes rapidly deployable joint forces, joint training, access to space, special operations, precision strike, and research and development, all of which are found in Florida. Air, land, and sea training areas and ranges associated with the Eastern Gulf Test & Training Range (EGTTR) host large, complex joint exercises that allow the services to train like they fight, thus bringing tremendous advantages to our military. Additionally, the EGTTR connects test and training ranges that extend from Key West to Northwest Florida and across the eastern Gulf of Mexico. It includes 180,000 square miles of DoD controlled airspace, as well as 724 sq. miles of adjacent land ranges, 3,200 sq. miles of airspace over adjacent land, 17 miles of shoreline access, interconnected radars and two launch areas. for missiles. The training area contains multiple livefire bombing ranges, including Pinecastle Range, Avon Park Air Force Range and the Eglin Bombing Range, that allow for simultaneous maritime, air, and land training exercises. Due to its tremendous capabilities and Florida's commitment to this partnership, the EGTTR is an integral part of the DoD's Training Resources Strategy.

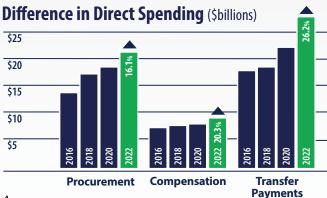


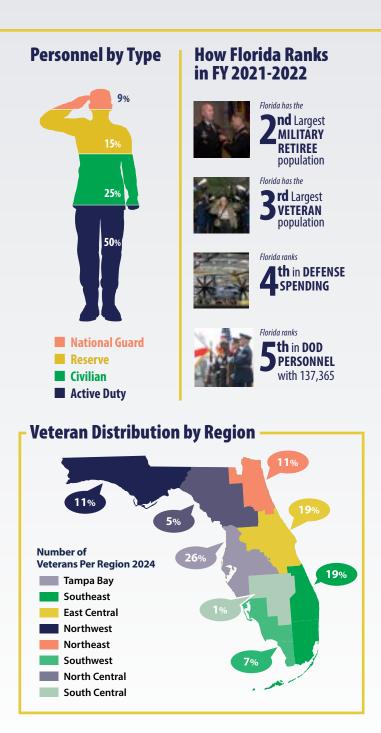

Defense as a Percent of Total Economy for Each Region

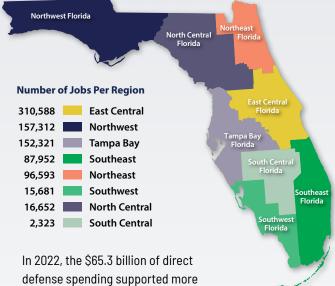

The sixteen-county Northwest Florida region is home to Tyndall Air Force Base, Naval Support Activity Panama City, Eglin Air Force Base, Hurlburt Field, Naval Air Station Whiting Field, Naval Air Station Pensacola, Corry Station and Saufley Field. Defense-related activities in Northwest Florida generated an estimated 157,312 jobs and more than \$20.6 billion in gross regional product (GRP), which accounted for 23.0% of the region's 2022 total gross product. Most of these economic impacts were generated by direct federal military spending, which produced 148,897 jobs and approximately \$19.1 billion of GRP, followed by the National Guard and Coast Guard who were responsible for 7,346 jobs and 1,068 jobs, respectively.

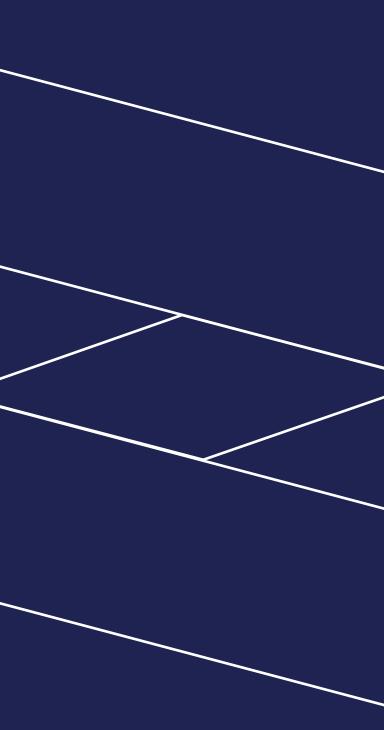

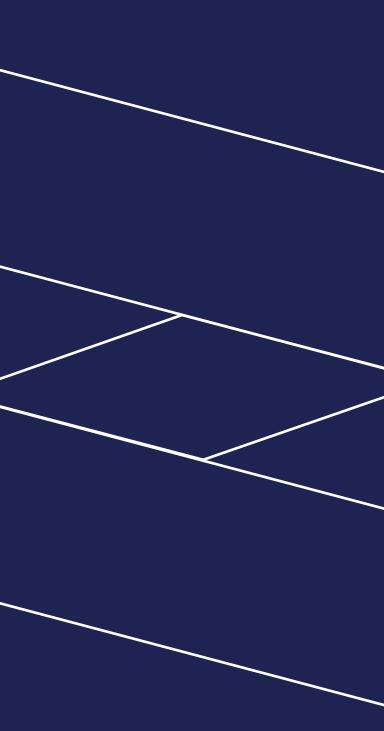

In 2022, there was nearly \$12.7 billion in direct spending related to defense activities within the region. These expenditures were responsible for 152,321 jobs and accounted for \$16.6 billion of GRP, or 5.3% of the region's total GRP. Most defense spending in the Tampa Bay region (more than 60%) came in the form of transfer payments to veterans and retirees. The bulk of the economic impacts in the region resulted from federal dollars flowing through the military - approximately \$15.3 billion GRP impact and 142,349 jobs. 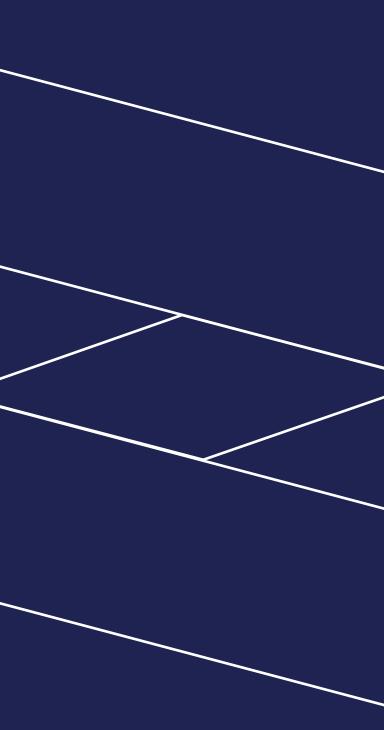

Defense spending brought more than \$7.1 billion dollars into the region, with transfers to veterans and retirees making up most of that spending (56%) at \$4.0 billion. This spending generated 87,952 jobs in the region and accounted for almost \$8.9 billion in GRP - 1.7% of the region's 2022 total GRP. Most of the economic impacts observed in Southeast Florida were a consequence of spending by the military, which was responsible for 77,989 jobs and \$7.6 billion of GRP impact. The National Guard spending generated \$468 million and 3,889 jobs while the Coast Guard accounted for \$808 million and 6,075 jobs.

The six-county South Central Florida region is home to the Avon Park Air Force Range. In 2022, roughly \$336 million in defense spending accounted for 2,323 jobs in the region and \$196 million in additional GRP – 2.2% of the region's total 2022 GRP. Most of the defense spending and its impacts observed in South Central Florida were fueled by federal military spending, which created 2,259 jobs and \$188 million in economic impact. The National Guard and Coast Guard combined were responsible for 64 jobs and \$7.4 million of GRP.

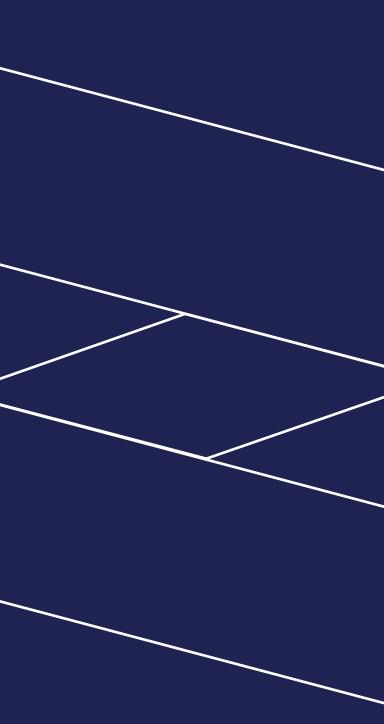

The three-county Southwest Florida region has no military installations, but still experienced some economic impacts associated with defense spending in 2022. Supported by a strong presence of military veterans and retirees, the Southwest Region received \$1.7 billion in direct defense spending, with pensions and transfers making up the majority of that total at nearly \$1.3 billion. The region's close proximity to both the Southeast and Tampa Bay regions generated economic spill-over effects that also helped to sustain the region's respectable defense economy. 2022 defense spending in the region generated 15,681 jobs and accounted for more than \$1.3 billion in GRP -1.8% of the region's total GRP.

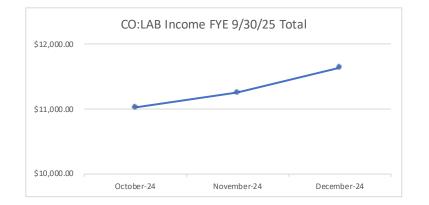

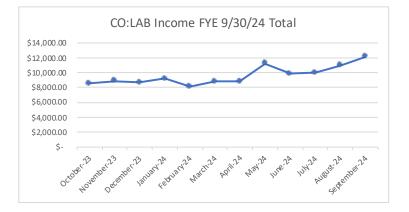
